As a member of the planning commission, you will have accepted the civic responsibility of helping residents and business and property owners articulate and achieve a vision for how they want their community to look and function in the future. The planning commission is the Town's primary entity responsible for long term, comprehensive planning.

The State of Maryland entrusts local jurisdictions with land use planning authority. Article 66B of the Maryland Annotated Code enables Brookeville to guide growth and development; outlines the responsibilities, roles, and functions of the planning commission; and sets the "ground rules" for operations.

INFRASTRUCTURE UPDATE

- ✓ The gravel roads bore the brunt of snow removal this past winter. You may have driven over one of the many potholes recently. The Town has contracted to make repairs to North, South and Water Streets starting this month. Thank you for your patience.
- ✓ The cast-iron light pole in front of 308
 Market Street that was run down by an
 errant driver back in March has been
 ordered. The new cast-iron light fixture will
 have a liteshield that throws the light out the
 sides of the fixture like an oval and helps to
 reduce light pollution. The new light pole
 should be installed by early August. In the
 mean time, our electrical contractor will be
 around to fix the ornamental light poles that
 are not functioning.

Brookeville Road Repairs are being considered by Montgomery County

The Montgomery County Department of Transportation has applied for a permit to repair Brookeville Road crossing over Reddy Branch Tributary near Market Street. The County hopes to replace twin 42" diameter Corrugate Metal Pipe culverts with a concrete box culvert. This is expected to reduce clogging and maintenance cost for the structure.

At the June Town Commissioner Meeting, Michael Acierno was selected by the Town Commissioners to serve another term as President of Commissioners. Commissioner Acierno was reelected to another 2 year term in the May election.



As much as half of the energy used in your home goes to heating and cooling. So making smart decisions about your home's heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) system can have a big effect on your utility bills — and your comfort. Take these steps to increase the efficiency of your heating and cooling system.

Change your air filter regularly. Check your filter every month, especially during heavy use months (winter and summer). If the filter looks dirty after a month, change it. At a minimum, change the filter every 3 months. A dirty filter will slow down air flow and make the system work harder to keep you warm or cool — wasting energy. A clean filter will also prevent dust and dirt from building up in the system — leading to expensive maintenance and/or early system failure.

Tune up your HVAC equipment yearly

Just as a tune-up for your car can improve your gas mileage, a yearly tune-up of your heating and cooling system can improve efficiency and comfort

A typical maintenance check-up should include the following.

- **Check thermostat settings** to ensure the cooling and heating system keeps you comfortable when you are home and saves energy while you are away.
- **Tighten all electrical connections** and measure voltage and current on motors. Faulty electrical connections can cause unsafe operation of your system and reduce the life of major components.
- **Lubricate all moving parts.** Parts that lack lubrication cause friction in motors and increases the amount of electricity you use.
- Check and inspect the condensate drain in your central air conditioner, furnace and/or heat pump (when in cooling mode). A plugged drain can cause water damage in the house and affect indoor humidity levels.
- **Check controls of the system** to ensure proper and safe operation. Check the starting cycle of the equipment to assure the system starts, operates, and shuts off properly.

Cooling Specific

- Clean evaporator and condenser air conditioning coils. Dirty coils reduce the system's ability to cool your home and cause the system to run longer, increasing energy costs and reducing the life of the equipment.
- Check your central air conditioner's refrigerant level and adjust if necessary. Too much or too little refrigerant will make your system less efficient increasing energy costs and reducing the life of the equipment.
- **Clean and adjust blower components** to provide proper system airflow for greater comfort levels. Airflow problems can reduce your system's efficiency by up to 15 percent.
- Inspect, clean, or change air filters once a month in your central air conditioner, furnace, and/or heat pump. A dirty filter can increase energy costs and damage your equipment, leading to early failure.

Install a programmable thermostat

A programmable thermostat is ideal for people who are away from home during set periods of time throughout the week. Through proper use of pre-programmed settings, a programmable thermostat can save you about \$180 every year in energy costs.

Seal your heating and cooling ducts

Ducts that move air to-and-from a forced air furnace, central air conditioner, or heat pump are often big energy wasters. Sealing and insulating ducts can improve the efficiency of your heating and cooling system by as much as 20 percent — and sometimes much more.

BE SAFE: There have been a large number of fraudulent solicitations for business (lawn maintenance, home care to name a few) by individuals going door-to-door these past weeks.

Please do not open your door to strangers, especially if you are home alone. Any legitimate solicitor will have a Montgomery County permit, which you should ask to see.

If you see any suspicious activity, call the Montgomery County Police non-emergency number, **301-279-8000**. Please note any personal details that could be helpful to the police such as height, weight, coloring, identify features (scars, tattoos); or car color, make, and model.

<u>311 Launched</u> – One Easy-to-Remember Phone Number Will Now Access Nearly All Montgomery County Government Services

Montgomery County Residents will now be able to call 311 to report an issue or request information from Montgomery County departments. The phone line will be staffed Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Along with the phone line, the County also launched a companion 311 website that is accessible 24 hours a day, seven days a week:

www.montgomery countymd.gov/311

Now, instead of trying to remember a county government phone number or dialing several departments before reaching the right one, phone requests can go to one central location— by dialing 311.

311 is accessible by most cell phone providers and will connect you when you are physically in Montgomery County. Fees may apply so check with your cell phone provider. Outside the County, access operators by calling 240-777-0311.
