Yard Waste

The Town will offer bagged yard waste collection during the month of November. Please place leaves, grass, brush, and other yard trimmings in large paper yard trim bags to be placed curbside by 7:00am on Monday's. The total weight of the bag must be 45 pounds or less.

The Town of Brookeville encourages you to use alternative methods for getting rid of leaves to save collection and disposal costs and to help the environment. Some alternatives are to mulch your leaves or to compost them.

Election Year 2010 Avoid Lines on Election Day--Vote Early

Town to purchase REC for Street Lights and One Room Schoolhouse

The Town will be receiving a total of \$600 from Clean Currents's Green Neighborhood Challenge to "green" the Town. The Green Neighborhood Challenge was spearheaded by Fred Teal, Jr. The Town will use part of the money to buy REC's to offset the carbon footprint for the street lights and the one room schoolhouse. Fred Teal, Jr. estimates the REC's will be \$36 a year total for both accounts. The remainder of the money will be used to purchase more trees.

What does REC mean?

A REC stands for a Renewable Energy Credit. RECs were created by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), as tools to track the clean energy being placed on the grid. One REC is equal to 1000 kWh of renewable energy produced. When a clean energy generator such as a wind farm produces electricity, it places that electricity onto the electric grid. The electric grid collects electricity from all power generators (coal, oil, natural gas power plants, wind farms, nuclear reactors, hydro dams, solar panel fields, etc). This aggregated electricity is then transmitted through wires to homes and businesses.

Green Tip of the Month - Waste Reduction

Last year, over 1.1 million tons of waste was generated in Montgomery County. The preferred method of managing solid waste begins with waste reduction. By reducing the amount of waste generated, there is no need to determine whether that material can be recycled, and if not, how it should be disposed.

Residents and businesses alike can take simple steps towards reducing their impact on the environment by reducing the amount of waste generated. Waste reduction can lead to reduced purchasing costs and lower disposal costs. Additional benefits include reducing the amount of energy and pollution generated to create products, and conserves natural resources for generations to come.

What can you do?

- When shopping, use reusable shopping bags. Try to refrain from taking a bag when purchasing one or just a few items.
- Purchase items in bulk.
- Save paper by sending information electronically whenever possible.
- If you must print, print on both sides of the paper. Use the backside of single-sided copies for scratch paper.
- Use rechargeable batteries.
- Make "waste-free" lunches. Use reusable and washable containers, flatware, and cloth napkins.
- Use reusable cups or mugs whenever possible, instead of using disposable cups.
- Request your address be removed from unwanted mailing lists. Visit DMAchoice.org or catalogchoice.org to remove your address from unwanted mailing lists.
- Consider purchasing and using refillable printing cartridges.
- Donate unwanted but good quality clothing, furniture, appliances and food to charitable organizations.
- Grasscycle your grass clippings by leaving the grass clippings on the lawn after mowing. If you use a lawn service company, let them know you want to grasscycle and request that they leave the grass clippings directly on the lawn. Grasscycling adds nutrients back into the soil, resulting in a healthy lawn. Grasscycling reduces the need to use commercial fertilizers, and reduces runoff from rain and melting snow.

Reduce / Reuse / Recycle

Maryland's Cellular Telephone Ban Begins on October 1st

Governor O'Malley signed a new that law prohibits all drivers in Maryland from using hand-held cell phones while operating a motor vehicle on a street or highway, effective October 1, 2010. Here are some key points to the new law:

- Drivers under 18 already are prohibited from using cell phones at all while driving.
- The exception to the law are for calls placed to 9-1-1, ambulance, hospital, fire, or law enforcement agencies are allowed, as are calls made by emergency and law enforcement personnel.
- The new law is a secondary offense, meaning a driver must first be detained for another offense, such as speeding or negligent driving, before he or she can be ticketed for a cell phone offense. However, "negligent driving" is a primary offense in Maryland and can be used as a precursor to citing violators of the new cell phone law.
- The fine for a first offense is \$40 and subsequent offenses are \$100. Points are not assessed to the first-time violator's driving record, except, three points are assessed if the violation contributes to a crash. If a violator has a second or subsequent offense, he or she receives a point plus the fine.
- Another law took effect in 2009 in Maryland that bans texting while driving. The primary texting law
 prohibits an individual from writing or sending text messages while operating a motor vehicle that is
 in motion or in the travel portion of the roadway. Violators may be assessed a fine not exceeding
 \$500. This law does not apply to texting 9-1-1 or using a global positioning system.
