Beyond the ByPass Task Force July 2, 2015 Notes

Goal of this Meeting: To review background for newcomers and develop Deadlines/timeline and a Charter Draft for the Beyond the Bypass Task Force

Review: all background materials can be found in the 2010 Brookeville Comprehensive Plan: http://townofbrookevilleM.org/wp-content/uploads/2013/03/BrookevilleComprehensivePlan.pdf

Available (all in Brookeville Comprehensive Plan): Summary Graphics of Brookeville history-in-brief, Maryland's "12 Visions", 2010 Brookeville Com Plan's "5 Goals" (which were created in an open process with Town residents prior to 2010).

NOTES from June 2nd, meeting:

Discussion regarding whether we are dealing with High Level versus Practical items. Concept is that we can use recent Town Survey as a mandate for making recommendations on practical (short-term) items in Light of the Vision. (Further discussion was about overlap between Planning Commission and Task Force activities)

Task Force as Supplement to Brookeville Planning Commission activities. BPC applies zoning code, deals with individual properties. (Should BTBTF members be present at BPC meetings? Next meeting: 7/7 and 8/4.

What is BTBTF role in terms of looking at Broader Goals for town? (vs BPC's role?). There is a feeling by some that TF should take on issues larger than single properties (as in "Proposed Charter", above).

** Potential Study Groups to be organized and staffed by the BTBTF: Water management; Blight (crumbling infrastructure); Sustainability (two aspects: environmental, financial); Historic Buildings; Walkability; Street/sidewalk
Conditions; Civic Life; Communications;
Community Discourse; (Events). "Practical"
study group (to define solutions for short-term
problems); Much of the discussion about Study
Groups was about Who does What by When:
Ownership, timeline, priorities to get things
done. (NOTE: Study Group members do not
need to be from the Task Force, might be
Brookeville residents with expertise or graduate
students with appropriate expertise, etc – the
important thing is to generate timely information
with community input, and expert input, to
inform all residents and decision-makers in
community)

Plan for charrette (Practical suggestions versus Vision). What are priorities for discussion during Charrette?

NEED to consider People and Civic Life, political power and physical plant; involvement of Brookeville residents at higher levels of government post-Bypass?

Questions: Should there be a standing town calendar on an annual basis? (see Brookeville monthly calendar, versus Lexington, MA annual calendar). Should there be the rolling Study Groups?

NEXT STEPS: DOODLE POLL SAYS: Our next meeting will be Thursday 20 August, 7:30-8:30pm; all town residents are still invited if you would like to serve on the Task Force (membership is not "closed" yet).

There are requirements for Task Force membership:

Commit to helping your neighbors by representing them via consistent presence at meetings.

Brookeville Goes to MML 2015 Annual Convention

Between June 28 and July 1, Commissioners Katherine Farquhar and Suzanne Daley attended the 2015 Maryland Municipal League (MML)

Annual Convention in Ocean City. The Convention theme was "Calm & Civility," and some 97 Maryland municipalities were represented. We were the second-smallest Town there (and... one of the few without a Town Flag!! Let's think about that...). Our registration and lodging for this convention were paid for by a scholarship from MML.

Once again in period attire, we received the MML's 2014 "Town Spirit" award in the Small Towns Category. During the convention, we attended numerous workshops, made many connections at the very large exhibit/ vendor area, and talked with other small town officials, state officials, and resource people from the MML and elsewhere.

At every opportunity, we talked about the Brookeville ByPass, including a conversation with the State's Secretary of Transportation, Pete Rahn. We expressed the Town's gratitude for the SHA's strong leadership of this project (in particular, Aimee Zhang who leads the working group on the ByPass). We heard again and again about Governor Hogan's support for this project.

We attended workshops on financial resilience, roadway maintenance, communicating during emergencies, and grant writing. The information we gathered was reported more fully at our last Commissioner meeting. We will immediately put to use what we learned. We welcome questions you might have about this Convention.

GOCA Votes a Resolution in Support of the ByPass:

As reported by State Senator Karen Montgomery, in their most recent meeting (July 14th), The Greater Olney Civic Association (GOCA) voted to support the ByPass. The wording they approved is below. There was only one dissenting vote. This public show of support for the ByPass is most welcome! Thank you, GOCA!!

Resolution in Support of the Brookeville Bypass

Whereas the town of Brookeville has historic significance that will be enhanced by the rerouting of through traffic around (as opposed to through) the center of town; and

Whereas trucks and cars have trouble navigating the hilly roads and sharp turns of the current configuration, evidenced by the damage to yards, houses, trees, cemetery, and lamp posts; and

Whereas truck vibrations crack the plaster walls of the historic homes; and

Whereas the intersection in the center of Brookeville and the narrow, winding route significantly impede traffic flow, creating back-ups that change the character of the town; and

Whereas the creation of the Bypass will have the result of improving the above problems, GOCA hereby resolves to support the construction of the Brookeville Bypass.

BYPASS UPDATE SHA MEETING OF 1 JULY

Brookeville Commissioner Sue Daley attended the July 1 SHA Brookeville ByPass planning meeting. She reported the focus of the meetings is starting to shift from primarily design-oriented to more tangible subjects. Acquiring necessary permits, parkland mitigation, soil borings, landscape design - all these are currently underway or beginning soon. Also, SHA has planning underway for the High Street sidewalk, but does not yet have a timetable for this project

There will be a public presentation of the current SHA design/plans Tuesday, September 29 from 6:00pm – 8:00pm at Longwood Community Center.
